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Course Description

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY: Plagiarism is the use of another person's work, writing or original ideas without giving credit to the source and is a serious academic offense. Examples of plagiarism include copying answers to homework assignments, copying or paraphrasing information found on the internet or in another source without citing the information as coming from a secondary source, and copying or paraphrasing research papers. Students caught plagiarizing, "sharing" work, copying or cheating will receive a ZERO for that assignment, as will the student who knowingly provided answers. Parents/guardians will be notified.

Coursework

• CLASSWORK is given daily. Tasks will vary: however, all students are expected to complete all tasks as directed. Classwork includes: Do Nows, worksheets, writing assignments, reading assignments, class conversations, etc.

- HOMEWORK: Students may be expected to complete classwork which has not been completed in class for homework. Other homework tasks may also be assigned. Homework is due the next class day.
- GROUP WORK: Collaborative work is expected and is done on a regular basis. Most group work will be done in class; however, there may be exceptions.
- NOTES: Class notes are an important resource. Although students may take notes at will; they will be told when note taking is mandatory.
- QUIZZES may be scheduled or unannounced and are usually expected to be completed individually.
- TESTS will be announced
- PROJECTS: There will be at least ONE project per marking period. Class time will most likely be devoted to the project. The project assignment, including directions, expectations, rubric, due date, etc. will be distributed in class and available on Google Classroom.
- PAPERS: Students are expected to write for various purposes and for varying amounts of time. There will be at least ONE extended written piece due per marking period. The writing assignment, including directions, topic, due date, etc. will be distributed in class and available on Google Classroom.
- READING ASSIGNMENTS: Students are expected to read with the class, in small groups and individually. If reading is assigned for homework, it will frequently be followed-up with a quiz.
- Students are expected to participate in class. A class participation grade may be given at the end of the marking period. This grade will not be lower than a student's average for the marking period.
- Honors students will complete at least one assigned independent reading and associated assignment/project per marking period.
